TV awards from June 1, 2023, to May 31, 2024, chosen by the Academy of TV Arts & Sciences. The ceremony was on September 15, 2024, live at Peacock Theater in Downtown LA and before that were the 76th Primetime Creative Arts Emmy Awards on September 7-8. In this main ceremony, Emmy Awards were given out for 25 categories. At the same time, Baby Reindeer, The Bear, and Shōgun all tied with four wins each, including Outstanding Limited or Anthology Series for Baby Reindeer and Outstanding Drama Series for Shōgun. Including Creative Arts Emmys, Shōgun had 18 wins, a record; FX won 36 total awards. The ceremony took place on September 15, 2024, at the Peacock Theater in Downtown Los Angeles, California, and was preceded by the 76th Primetime Creative Arts Emmy Awards on September 7 and 8. The event was hosted by Eugene Levy and Dan Levy and featured 25 categories. Baby Reindeer, The Bear, and Shōgun tied for the most wins with four each, while Hacks won three awards. Shōgun led all programs with 18 wins, including Outstanding Limited or Anthology Series and Outstanding Drama Series. Other winning shows included Alex Edelman: Just for Us, The Crown, The Daily Show, Fargo, Last Week Tonight with John Oliver, The Morning Show, Ripley, Slow Horses, The Traitors, and True Detective: Night Country. The nominations were announced on July 17, 2024, in a virtual broadcast hosted by Tony Hale, Sheryl Lee Ralph, and Cris Abrego. The awards ceremony announced its winners for Outstanding Drama Series after Squid Game, which was nominated two years earlier. The Bear broke the record with 23 nominations, surpassing 30 Rock's record of 22 nominations in 2009. Native American women Lily Gladstone and Kali Reis became the first to receive acting nominations, as did D'Pharaoh Woon-A-Tai. Netflix secured 107 nominations, followed by FX with 93 nominations. The winners were announced on September 15, after the Creative Arts Emmys on September 7 and 8. FX won a total of 36 awards, leading all networks and platforms for the first time. The show Shōgun became the first non-English-language series to win Outstanding Drama Series with 18 awards. The Bear surpassed its own record with 11 wins, while The Crown broke Game of Thrones's 12-year win streak in 2015, 2016, and 2019 for most wins by a drama series. Japanese performers Hiroyuki Sanada and Anna Sawai won Outstanding Lead Actor in a Drama Series and Outstanding Lead Actress in a Drama Series, respectively. Nominees for Outstanding Performance in Various Categories Several individuals have been nominated for their performances in various television series and movies. In the category of Outstanding Lead Actor in a Comedy Series, nominees include Steve Martin as Charles-Haden Savage in Only Murders in the Building, Martin Short as Oliver Putnam in Only Murders in the Building, and D'Pharaoh Woon-A-Tai as Bear Smallhill in Reservation Dogs. In the category of Outstanding Lead Actress in a Comedy Series, nominees include Jean Smart as Deborah Vance in Hacks, Quinta Brunson as Janine Teagues in Abbott Elementary, Ayo Edebiri as Sydney Adamu in The Bear, and Selena Gomez as Mabel Mora in Only Murders in the Building. In the category of Outstanding Lead Actor in a Drama Series, nominees include Hiroyuki Sanada as Lord Yoshii Toranaga in Shōgun, Idris Elba as Sam Nelson in Hijack, Donald Glover as John Smith/Michael in Mr. & Mrs. Smith, and Walton Goggins as the Ghoul/Cooper Howard in Fallout. In the category of Outstanding Lead Actress in a Drama Series, nominees include Anna Sawai as Toda Mariko in Shōgun, Jennifer Aniston as Alex Levy in The Morning Show, Carrie Coon as Bertha Russell in The Gilded Age, and Maya Erskine as Jane Smith/Alana in Mr. & Mrs. Smith. In the category of Outstanding Lead Actor in a Limited or Anthology Series or Movie, nominees include Richard Gadd as Donny Dunn in Baby Reindeer, Matt Bomer as Hawkins "Hawkeye" Fuller in Fellow Travelers, Jon Hamm as Sheriff Roy Tillman in Fargo, and Tom Hollander as Truman Capote in Feud: Capote vs. The Swans. In the category of Outstanding Lead Actress in a Limited or Anthology Series or Movie, nominees include Jodie Foster as Detective Elizabeth Danvers in True Detective: Night Country, Brie Larson as Elizabeth Zott in Lessons in Chemistry, Juno Temple as Dorothy "Dot" Lyon in Fargo, and Naomi Watts as Babe Paley in Feud: Capote vs. The Swans. In the category of Outstanding Supporting Actor in a Comedy Series, nominees include Ebon Moss-Bachrach as Richard "Richie" Jerimovich in The Bear, Lionel Boyce as Marcus Brooks in The Bear, Paul W. Downs as Jimmy LuSaque Jr. in Hacks, and Paul Rudd as Ben Glenroy in Only Murders in the Building. In the category of Outstanding Supporting Actress in a Comedy Series, nominees include Liza Colón-Zayas as Tina Marrero in The Bear, Carol Burnett as Norma Dellacorte in Palm Royale, Hannah Einbinder as Ava Daniels in Hacks, and Meryl Streep as Loretta Durkin in Only Murders in the Building. In the category of Outstanding Supporting Actor in a Drama Series, nominees include Billy Crudup as Cory Ellison in The Morning Show, Tadanobu Asano as Kashigi Yabushige in Shōgun, Mark Duplass as Charles "Chip" Black in The Morning Show, and Takehiro Hira as Ishido Kazunari in Shōgun. Edinburgh Award Winners Elizabeth Debicki as Diana, Princess of Wales in The Crown Christine Baranski as Agnes van Rhijn in The Gilded Age Nicole Beharie as Christina Hunter in The Morning Show Greta Lee as Stella Bak in The Morning Show Lesley Manville as Princess Margaret in The Crown Karen Pittman as Mia Jordan in The Morning Show Holland Taylor as Cybil Richards in The Morning Show The 2023 Emmy Awards recognized several programs for their outstanding achievements, including writing, acting, directing, and more. Prime Video's "Mr. & Mrs. Smith: First Date" and "Shōgun: Anjin" were among the nominees for Outstanding Writing for a Limited or Anthology Series or Movie. Netflix's "Baby Reindeer" was recognized for its writing, while FX's "Shōgun: Crimson Sky" also received an award. Other notable winners included "Black Mirror: 'Joan Is Awful'" and "Fargo: The Tragedy of the Commons," both nominated for Outstanding Writing. Showtime's "Fellow Travelers: You're Wonderful" also received a nomination, as did several programs on HBO, including "True Detective: Night Country" and "The Gilded Age." Several other shows were recognized for their writing, including "Just for Us" on HBO, "Get on Your Knees" on Netflix, and "Now More Than Ever" on HBO. Other winners included Mike Birbiglia's special "The Old Man and the Pool" on Netflix. The Governors Award was presented to Greg Berlanti in recognition of his impact on television and culture by depicting underrepresented groups. Networks with multiple nominations Multiple networks received numerous nominations, including Netflix (93 and 33), FX (91 and 23), HBO/Max (70 and 26), Apple TV+ (38 and 9), ABC (2 and no wins), CBS (37 and 8), Prime Video (33 and 4), NBC (26 and 7), Hulu (19 with no major wins), Disney+ (10 and 1), MTV (9 and 1), Peacock (6 and 1), Bravo (no wins), Fox, Paramount+, Comedy Central, BBC America, and Showtime. Networks with multiple wins Several networks achieved significant wins, including FX (24 and 6), Netflix (14 and 6), HBO/Max (9 and 2), Apple TV+ (7 with no major wins), ABC, Disney+, Hulu, NBC, CBS, Prime Video, Peacock, Comedy Central, National Geographic. Christine Baranski, Viola Davis, Gina Torres paid tribute to TV lawyers, while Dule Hill, Allison Janney, Janel Moloney, Richard Schiff, and Martin Sheen honored The West Wing's 25th anniversary. Catherine O'Hara presented the Outstanding Comedy Series award. On February 10, 2024, the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences announced the ceremony dates: September 7-8 for Creative Arts and September 15 for Primetime. ABC broadcast the event as part of a four-year rotation deal among the "Big Four" networks signed in 2018. The ceremony was produced by Jesse Collins Entertainment for the second consecutive year. The main ceremony saw a change in Outstanding Writing for a Variety Series, with mixed reviews from critics overall.[39] Some compared it unfavorably to the January show, citing issues like music choices and sound problems.[40][41] Hosts Eugene Levy and Dan Levy received mixed feedback, with some finding them underwhelming but others praising their light-hearted approach.[42][43] The ceremony also saw a resurgence in viewership, drawing 6.9 million people in the United States, making it the most-viewed Emmys in three years and a 54% increase over the previous year's ceremony.[47][48] Despite this, the telecast received praise for its positive tone and avoidance of self-congratulation, with some highlighting the hosts' dynamic and the variety show-style presenters as highlights.[46] The In Memoriam tribute featured singer Jelly Roll performing his song "I Am Not Okay" and paid tribute to several individuals in the industry. The 76th Primetime Emmy Awards honored outstanding work in television for the 2023-2024 season. The ceremony took place on September 15, 2024. The nominees and winners included a diverse range of talent from various fields. Notable presenters and performers included Susan Wojcicki, Leo Chaloukian, George Schenck, Samm-Art Williams, Peter Marshall, Frances Sternhagen, Phil Donahue, Louis Gossett Jr., Martin Starger, Ryan O'Neal, Andrea Fay Friedman, Gena Rowlands, Richard Simmons, Shamen Doherty, Robert MacNeil, Chance Perdomo, Carl Weathers, Richard Lewis, Donald Sutherland, James Earl Jones, and Bob Newhart. The show was hosted by Jimmy Kimmel, who delivered a brief eulogy for the late comedian and talk show host, Bob Newhart. Among the nominees were programs such as 'Shogun,' which led with 25 nods, followed closely by 'The Bear' with 23 nominations. This marked a record-breaking achievement for both series. The Emmy Awards also recognized the work of Indigenous actors Lily Gladstone, D'Pharaoh Woon-A-Tai, and Kali Reis, who were among the first to receive nominations in their field in over 17 years. In the end, FX emerged as the winner with the most Emmys for the 2024 season, while 'Shogun' broke a record by winning 18 awards in one season.
