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When my son expressed his desire to dress up as Edward Scissorhands for Halloween, I knew we were in for a treat making this unique costume. As he literally became Edward that night, it was clear our DIY project would be an unforgettable experience. Over the past year, many people have asked how we created this mostly simple Edward Scissorhands costume, so here's our step-by-step guide. First, collect various black belts from thrift stores like Salvation Army over several months. You'll need a lot of them - ten for our 4-year-old son, but bigger bodies will require more. Look for belts with plenty of grommets, studs, and big metal buckles; the more visually interesting they are, the better. Next, sew together a basic black pleather suit using cheap fabric from the store (we bought 1.5 yards for our small son). Note that you don't need to be a seamstress - just follow a simple pattern around a shirt and pants, leaving about half an inch on each side for sewing. Pleather is easy to work with and forgiving. Once you have your pleather suit, arrange the belts in various ways until it looks good. Don't cut any of them yet, as this will be based on their placement on the shirt and pants. Use hot glue guns to attach the belts to the suit, then reinforce them with black electrical tape for added security. For the scissorhands part of the costume, start with a pair of well-fitted black knit gloves. Using cardboard from toilet paper rolls, create the robotic back part of the glove by spray-painting it shiny black and attaching it to the back of each glove using glue guns. File down ten plastic knives to flatten their curve (safety first!) and attach them to three fingers of each glove with electrical tape. For one finger on each hand, create an actual scissor by screwing two butter knives together with a small screw and nut. Finish off the gloves by cutting a circle from 2" PVC pipe, spray-painting it black, and attaching it as the loop at the top of the "scissor". Secure the thumb with electrical tape (Edward's thumb doesn't have scissors!). For an authentic look, consider letting your child grow out their hair to Edward's signature style or use a wig. To achieve the stuck-up look, use a max-strength styling product and blow-dry upside-down while leaning over. Finish off with hairspray and touch up any roots. Finally, for makeup, start with semi-unnatural white foundation as the base, add some shadows under the eyes and cheekbones (Johnny Depp-inspired), then smudge red lipstick to create scars in various spots. Finish with a natural lip color using the same white foundation. With these steps, you can create an almost identical Edward Scissorhands costume for your kids, ready for Halloween night!The toddler was drawn in by the tangle of fur, saw his fidgety, sticky-fingered kiddo, and gave one suspicious yap, catching his attention immediatly. But your little boy approached slowly, despite th dog's clear prejudice, and gently patted its head. He'd had no practis petting an animal but based on the dog's contented response, your toddler knew exactly what he was doing. And then you saw him tending to the backyard garden. With just his fingers, he thoughtfully picked decaying leaves and turned sad shrubs into art!

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
