If you determine you are not fit to drive, advise your supervisor or the Safety Officer and indicate a replacement will need to be found to complete the trip. Drivers must not drive nor should any person permit a person to drive that is not considered fit to drive. If you can, with a clear conscience answer positively to all of the points below, check the 'FMDD' box in the date column for each day you drive.
