Since their mysterious premiere at the Crystal Palace Cat Show in 1871, genetic testing has determined that Abyssinians likely developed somewhere along the Indian Ocean's coastal regions and parts of southeast Asia. A taxidermied cat with the Aby's ruddy color and ticked markings at the Leiden Zoological Museum in the Netherlands supports this theory; the stuffed cat is thought to have hailed from India. Many believe Abyssinians were given their name because Zula, the cat displayed at the 1871 Crystal Palace Cat Show, was allegedly imported from Abyssinia (present-day Ethiopia). The external population of cats also has an impact, with a high population density creating a high-stress factor, irrespective in many cases whether the resident cats have an indoor or outdoor lifestyle, as cats can be seen through windows. To help your cats, try: Avoiding multi-cat households (or limit to two cats) in areas of high population densitySecuring garden to exclude other cats (cat-proof fencing)Using safe deterrents in the garden if cats are coming into the garden and bothering indoor cats
