Has anyone successfully taken their own official photos for documents like passports, driving licenses, and had them accepted? If so, please share your experience, including what you used and how much it cost. There are online sites that allow you to upload a picture and help resize it, but I understand that if the printing is wrong, it will be rejected. I'm considering doing my own for my driving license after seeing how most photo booths charge around £5 and just wondered how easy it is to save money by the DIY route. **Note** This discussion has been closed due to the risk of political debates on the forum. When you don't need a photo for your driving licence application, you can proceed without one. This applies if the reason for applying is to change your name and/or address or to obtain a duplicate copy of your existing licence. If you need a new photo due to a significant change in appearance, however, you'll have to renew your licence and provide a fresh photograph. The guidelines for digital photos and printed photos are different, so be sure to follow the correct rules. For digital photos, use an existing one that meets the specified requirements or get a friend to take one for you. If the photo doesn't meet the rules, your application may be returned. You can also use the photo code service available at various locations throughout Northern Ireland, which allows the Driver & Vehicle Agency (DVA) to download your photograph directly. The following pharmacies and photo booths are located in various towns across Northern Ireland. Bangor has four locations: - Max Photobooth (c/o Asda) - Max Photobooth (c/o Tesco, South Circular Road) - Max Photobooth (c/o Tesco, Killeen Avenue) - c/o Tesco - McKeever's Chemists Comber and Downpatrick have pharmacies listed. In Dundrum, there is a Groves Chemists on Main Street. Hollywood and Killeel both have Gordons Chemists locations. Killyleagh has Gabbies Pharmacy. Lisburn has several pharmacy locations: - Gordons Chemists - Max Photobooth (c/o Tesco) Mayobridge has Mayobridge Pharmacy, and Newcastle has McKeever's Chemists on Main Street. Newry is home to Dineen Office Supplies, DOCSOL, Gordons Chemists, McKeever's Chemists, and Max Photobooth. The list continues with pharmacies in Newtownards, Poyntzpass, Rathfriland, Saintfield, Warrenpoint, and County Armagh. There are two separate lists of locations that offer a photo code service. The first list has 25 outlets in County Londonderry and surrounding areas. These locations include pharmacies, chemists, and post offices, as well as some retail stores like Tesco and Asda. Some examples of specific locations include Middletown Post Office, Gordons Chemists in Portadown, and Smyths Country Sports in Coleraine. The second list has 30 outlets in County Tyrone and surrounding areas. Again, these locations include pharmacies, chemists, post offices, and retail stores like Tesco and Asda. Some specific examples of locations in this list include McKeever's Chemists in Aughnacloy, O'Neill Ltd in Ballygawley, and Bradley's Pharmacy in Dromore. It appears that the photo code service is offered at various pharmacies and chemist shops across these two counties. Digital photo rules: * Use a plain light-coloured background with no patterns or textures. * Don't have objects behind you. * No shadows on your face or behind you - use natural sunlight. * Stand 0.5 metres (1.5 feet) away from your background. * Include your head, shoulders and upper body in the photo. * Look straight at the camera with a plain expression. Guidelines for printed photos that are posted: * Printed to a high quality. * Taken within the last month. * A true likeness of you. * Full head in colour against a light grey or cream background (45mm high x 35mm wide) * Clear, in sharp focus, free from 'red eye' and with no shadow in it. * Free of any reflection or glare from glasses (where possible, remove your glasses to avoid the possibility of rejection). Note: The following video also explains how to take a good digital photo: How to take a digital photo (same rules as digital passport photos). You are required to wear sunglasses or tinted glasses when taking your photograph for driving licence application, unless it's for medical or religious reasons. You must also get a certified photo and have an authorized person sign the back of your picture if you're using a non-UK or EEA passport or travel document. Your photo should meet certain requirements, including being recent, clear, and in good condition, with no reflections or glare from glasses. You should avoid heavy makeup and wear a neutral expression. The photo must be printed in high quality and of the correct size for your licence application. To confirm the authenticity of a document with an additional signature, known as a counter-signature, it is necessary to have someone known personally who meets specific requirements. In the UK, the counter-signatory must be a resident and live in the country for at least two years, hold a valid NI driving license issued after April 1, 1999, and be a professional or work in an occupation recognized by their community. Examples of eligible occupations include accountant, airline pilot, attorney, engineer, nurse, and police officer. If updating a photo on a driving license is required, the individual must meet specific requirements including being a resident of the UK, having a valid passport, and proof of residence for the last three years. To update the photo, one can follow steps on the DVLA online portal, answering eligibility questions and paying an application fee by credit or debit card. You need to make sure your new photo is updated on your driver's licence, but if you can't get a fresh one from your passport, you won't be able to change it online – instead, you'll have to send the update in the post. If that's the case, follow this path: grab Form D1 'Application for a Driving Licence' from the Post Office, and make sure you've got these documents ready: a passport photo taken recently, your current photocard and paper licence, a cheque or postal order for £17 to DVLA, and any ID papers if you've changed your name. Then mail your application and fee to DVLA in Swansea – keep in mind that forgetting to update is going to cost you £1000! You can use your phone to take the photo as long as it meets all the strict DVLA standards, or edit one online with AiPassportPhotos if needed. If you have a biometric passport, your provisional licence photo's already taken care of - just use the same pic from your passport for the online application. And hey, don't wear white in your licence photo, as it'll get lost against the background - soft colours like blue or green are way more flattering! Just make sure your passport-sized photo meets all the requirements and has those valid counters on the back to avoid any issues. Oh, and yes, you do need a fee whether you're applying online or by post - don't forget that part!
